

Associate in Science in Criminal Justice

The 64-credit Associate in Science in Criminal Justice degree emphasizes social science perspectives within the study of criminal justice. This degree can prepare you for entry-level positions in criminal justice, or it can be used as a step toward the Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice (also offered online) or another social science bachelor's degree, if you choose to apply and are accepted into the program.

The courses in the program are taught by leading Penn State Harrisburg School of Public Affairs faculty, and your diploma will look no different than one earned by a student studying on campus.

Bachelor's Program Curriculum

The curriculum for the bachelor's degree in criminal justice offers a solid foundation in the field. The courses focus on the history, practice, and science of both adult and juvenile criminal justice. Many course options are available to complete the program, allowing you to customize the degree to meet your specific interests and career goals.

Take 120 credits in such topic areas as:

- Border Security
- > Courts and the Prosecution Process
- > Criminological Theory
- > Fthics
- > Incarceration Alternatives
- Juvenile Justice System
- > Police Administration
- > Policing and Corrections in America
- > Victimology

Homeland Security Minor

If you are interested in gaining an understanding of homeland security issues to better set yourself apart on the career ladder, consider Penn State's online Minor in Homeland Security (HLS). The program covers homeland security and defense issues — including emergency management, homeland security policy, and the structure of homeland security operations. You can fulfill most of the requirements of the minor while completing your bachelor's degree in criminal justice (CRIMJ). The required courses for the HLS minor can fit into the major in the supporting courses section or as electives. Several HLS courses are cross-listed with CRIMJ, so they count toward both CRIMJ electives and the HLS minor. You can obtain a minor or a double-major without having to take additional credits.

Graduate Certificate in Global Justice and Security

With increased global connectedness, transnational crime groups have reaped the benefits of being able to carry out illicit activities beyond national borders. International security organizations and national criminal justice agencies respond to these threats through collaborative efforts, resulting in a need for individuals who can recognize trends, analyze data and communications, communicate with various stakeholder groups, and develop coordinated strategies. Designed primarily for working professionals, this graduate certificate is ideal for both domestic and international criminal justice practitioners who want to expand their knowledge and skills in global justice and security issues and advance their careers.

Successful graduates will be able to:

- > explain the push-and-pull factors of global criminal activities
- identify international crime control strategies
- analyze global crime trends and evaluate responses
- examine contemporary policing strategies against global terrorism
- offer alternative policing approaches to combat global crime

Master of Professional Studies in Criminal Justice Policy and Administration

The online MPS in CJPA capitalizes on Penn State's strengths as a premier research institution to provide an advanced professional degree, offered by the Penn State College of the Liberal Arts' Department of Sociology and Criminology and the Penn State Harrisburg School of Public Affairs. Combining theory and applied research, this degree allows professionals and students entering the workforce to gain graduate-level expertise in this growing applied field of study. The program could be an excellent credential for professionals in criminal justice (policing, courts, corrections, probation/parole, and treatment), government, administration, and offender/victim services

Career Opportunities for Graduates

As a graduate of this program, you can use your newfound skills, knowledge, and experience to bring about change in any number of criminal justice or legal organizations in the public sector.

Organizations and agencies in need of professionals with these skills include:

- state departments of corrections, sentencing commissions, and parole boards
- local, county, and state law enforcement, especially in administration and planning sectors
- > local court administration, especially drug, DUI, and restorative justice courts
- > local, probation, parole, and community corrections agencies

- public and private offender treatment agencies
- > state policy agencies focused on criminal justice (e.g., the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, and similar agencies in other states)
- > U.S. Federal Bureau of Prisons
- U.S. Sentencing Commission, and the Federal Judicial Center (which houses the Administrative Office of U.S. Courts and Federal Probation)
- > U.S. Department of Justice and its various subdivisions (e.g., National Institute of Justice, Bureau of Justice Statistics, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, and Executive Office for U.S. Attorneys)

Master's Program Curriculum

The 30-credit program of study emphasizes social science perspectives in the study of criminal justice.

Take core courses (18 credits) in such topic areas as:

- Advanced Statistics in Criminal Justice
- Applied Research Methods for Criminal Justice
- Criminal Justice Ethics in a Diverse Society
- Criminal Justice Institutions
- > Criminal Procedure
- > Theories of Crime

Choose from elective courses (9 credits) in such topic areas as:

- > American Constitutional Law
- American Court and Correctional Systems
- > The Death Penalty
- Incarceration Alternatives
- > Police Administration
- > Policy Analysis and Planning
- Psychological Foundations of Leadership
- Public Policy and the Criminal Justice Systems
- Sentencing
- > Victimology

Complete your learning with a capstone experience (3 credits)

Your culminating experience can provide you with the opportunity to apply your knowledge from your courses to a project mutually selected by you and faculty mentors. For example, the capstone experience could be an academic research project, an evidence-based policy evaluation, or the development of a new program.

Upon completion of the MPS in CJPA, you should be able to:

- describe and summarize crime rates, trends, and patterns, and apply foundational knowledge of criminological theories devoted to explaining crime
- discuss organizational structure, processes, and challenges of criminal justice institutions, and analyze past and current criminal justice policies and evidence-based practices
- apply the foundations of contemporary ethical practices and effective leadership in the criminal justice profession
- employ advanced knowledge in social science research and applied statistical methods, specifically focused on criminal justice issues
- demonstrate advanced knowledge of criminal procedure
